# **Institute Updates**

### **New Toolkit for Family Literacy Programing**

The Goodling Institute for Research in Family Literacy is pleased to announce a valuable resource for organizations thinking about starting a new or improving an existing family literacy program. In collaboration with the Virginia Adult Learning Resource Center at Virginia Commonwealth University, we developed <a href="From scratch: Using AEFLA funds to develop a family literacy program.">From scratch: Using AEFLA funds to develop a family literacy program.</a>. The toolkit was originally prepared for the state of Virginia to support agencies that had received family literacy planning grants. Authors Elizabeth Severson-Irby and Carol Clymer adapted the Virginia toolkit for others interested in starting a family literacy program. Evidence-based strategies, resources, worksheets, and program examples are provided to help practitioners develop a well-rounded, intergenerational, four-component family literacy program. Although the toolkit focuses on using AEFLA funds, it contains generic information that is useful for anyone involved in family literacy programming.





### **Career Pathways Success Story!**



Melissa Kinley, a dedicated student in the Lycoming County Career Pathways Program, recently completed her high school equivalency diploma!

Melissa, a mother of two who worked in food service, had originally left high school in tenth grade but decided to go back to school to get her diploma. In 2019, she started classes at Career Pathways and struggled to pass her math HiSet test. She always told her own children to finish what they started and never give up, so she decided to take her own advice.

With the support of her husband and children, as well as her Math 1 teacher, Ruth Love-Schooley, Math 2 teacher, Gayle Willitts, and ELA teacher, Martha Hunter, she persevered with the shift to remote instruction during the pandemic. She took both morning and online classes and completed over 40 hours of supplemental

distance learning. Even when she did not initially pass the Math portion of the HiSet, she remained dedicated to her educational journey by continuing her classes and re-taking the test.

In December 2021, Melissa completed her goal of passing the HiSet test and receiving her high school equivalency diploma. Way to go Melissa- you are an inspiration!

# Recent Webinar on Family Literacy and Indigenous and Local Learning





The Library of Congress Literacy Award Program is now accepting applications, The awards are intended to draw public attention to the importance of literacy, and the need to promote literacy and encourage reading.

Since 2013, the Library of Congress Literacy Awards Program has awarded \$2,247,250 million in prizes to 136 institutions in 36 countries. By recognizing current achievements, the awards seek to enable any organization or program that does not operate on a for-profit basis to strengthen its involvement in literacy and reading promotion and to encourage collaboration with likeminded organizations.
